

Message from the President

The 2014 Fall TASSR Conference is just a few weeks away. Some excellent presentations in a variety of areas related to student success and retention are ready to be shared with this year's attendees. We encourage full-time colleagues, not only faculty, but retention specialists, enrollment management personnel, tutors, counselors, learning specialists, adjunct faculty, administrators, and students to join as we explore "Preparing for the Journey: Enrollment to Completion."

The three-day conference will include presentations from 4 nationally recognized student success and retention specialists, and you will have more than 25 concurrent sessions from which to choose on Thursday and Friday. You can visit with several vendors whose products and services support student success and retention. In addition, we have planned four buffet meals (Wednesday dinner, Thursday breakfast and lunch, and Friday Breakfast) and will have beverage breaks throughout the conference. Cost of the facility rental and services have increased, but we are still able to keep the cost to \$100 per person for the entire conference. Membership in TASSR is just \$20. Wow!

Since the Jackson Foundation gifted The Renaissance Center to Freed-Hardeman University in November 2013, some significant upgrades to the infrastructure of the building have occurred, and Wi-Fi is readily available throughout the facility. When the TASSR Executive Board met at the facility in September, we tested the Wi-Fi, and it was working very well. We will be using a new conference app known as TOPI, which can be downloaded to your wireless devices through the Apple (iPad or iPhone) or Google Play (Android) stores. The conference agenda and sessions schedule and room locations will be readily available with live updates and changes sent immediately to your device. You can also access conference handouts and other materials through TOPI. There are some really useful features that come with this app, and we will go over what you need to know during the general/meal sessions. One really nice feature is that you can network with other attendees at the conference and afterward. All of the

2014 TASSR conference information/materials loaded on the app will be available to you for 12 months following the conference.

A Pre-conference Session – Wednesday, October 28, 2014 – 2:00-5:00 “Brain-Based Learning: The Essentials for the Journey”

We are very pleased to offer a “first” for the TASSR Conference - a pre-conference session. Most of the time traditional 50-minute conference sessions provide us with excellent information and ideas to take and share with colleagues. However, there are some concepts and ideas that warrant spending additional “hands-on” time visualizing, practicing, and processing.

I have attended numerous national student success conferences and have listened and participated in many pre-conference sessions. I have found them to be some of the best and most helpful activities of the entire conference. I shared the idea of having a pre-conference session with the TASSR board several months ago and asked them to think about us offering one or two this year. When they agreed with the idea, I knew immediately I wanted to invite Dr. Carolyn Hopper, a nationally recognized learning specialist, author, and professor, to conduct the first 3-hour pre-conference. I have attended several of Dr. Hopper’s extended sessions at conferences throughout the United States and have always been inspired and motivated to return to my campus and begin to “change the world” for my students. I was thrilled when she agreed to be TASSR’s first pre-conference session presenter.

To attend Dr. Hopper’s session, “Brain-Based Learning: The Essentials for the Journey,” you need to register for it. As you complete the online registration process through Everbrite, [TASSR Conference Registration](#), and you click to pay, you will be taken to a page where you are asked to click on the items you are attending, and the last item on the page is the pre-conference registration. Be sure to click on that button if you want to join us. We definitely need a count of attendees to make sure we have the right size room and enough materials for each participant. The cost of the pre-conference is FREE! What a bargain!!

Keynote Addresses

Dr. Sue Cain, a Senior Policy Advisor and Coordinator of College Readiness and Developmental Education at the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education, who many of you met and heard at last fall’s TASSR conference, is back and will be the first keynote speaker to officially begin our conference. Dr. Cain serves as a state and national representative on creating P-12, adult education, and postsecondary partnerships to align standards, assessments, and accountability systems. She leads work to identify, design, and implement policy and practices supporting college and career readiness and developmental education transformation.

Her presentation, which will be during the Thursday morning breakfast and general session, is entitled, “Secondary and Postsecondary Partnerships for College Readiness.” Later in the day, Dr. Cain will continue her discussion in a 50-minute session on “The Impact of Creating and Sustaining Secondary and Postsecondary Partnerships for College Readiness.”

We are pleased to welcome co-presenters, **Mr. Wayne Jackson and Mr. Tony Davis**, who will deliver our second keynote address for the conference during Thursday's luncheon and awards ceremony. Some of you may have heard Mr. Jackson's presentation at MTSU's Summit this past spring. The conference presentation is entitled, "How to Develop a Mentoring Program." Some of you will no doubt want to join Mr. Jackson and Mr. Davis later in the conference for their concurrent session entitled, "How to Retain the Multicultural Male."

Wayne Jackson is an award winning student affairs administrator and Director of the Multicultural Academic and Support Services Department at the University of Central Florida, where he provides academic support for more than 31,000 multicultural and first generation students on the UCF campus. Mr. Jackson was awarded the 2010 NACADA Outstanding Institutional Advising Program Certificate of Merit for his leadership in directing the department's summer bridge program called SOAR (Seizing Opportunities for Achievement and Retention). Maurice A. "Tony" Davis is a native of Clarksburg, WV, and he graduated from West Virginia Wesleyan College with a BA in Youth Services and West Virginia University with an MA in Counseling. He is enrolled in the Counseling Psychology Ph.D. program at Teacher's College of Columbia University. Currently, he serves as a Counselor at Montgomery County Community College (MCCC), Blue Bell, PA. His previous post at the college was Assistant Director of Admissions where he founded the Montgomery County Alliance of Black Students (MABS).

TASSR to Honor Outstanding Members, Students

The 2014 TASSR Conference will begin October 29, 2014, and during the conference the Awards Committee will present two prestigious awards!

The **TASSR Award for Outstanding Service to Students in Learning Support Programs** recognizes long-term contribution of time and energy to students in Learning Support Programs by a TASSR member. Criteria for evaluation include the following: (a) nominee will have spent approximately half or more of their time serving learning support students through teaching and/or administration for at least five years; (b) evaluation will include both the nominee's record of service and recognition by others; (c) nominee must be a member of TASSR at the time of nomination.

The **TASSR Award to an Outstanding Alumnus of a Learning Support Program**

recognizes a student who has been in a Learning Support Program and who has distinguished him/herself in other areas of life. Criteria for evaluation include the following: (a) the nominee must have completed at least two learning support courses or participated in at least two of the following support program activities: TRIO Upward Bound, TRIO Student Support Services, high school-to-college bridge program, special admissions program, enrollment in learning support classes (e.g., math, writing, learning strategies, reading); (b) the nominee must have outstanding accomplishments outside the classroom.

Kellogg Institute 2015 -- June 20 – July 17



Since 1980, the Kellogg Institute for the Certification of Adult and Developmental Educators has offered an advanced professional development and certification program for those seeking to enhance their knowledge of the field and improve developmental and learning assistance programs. Sponsored by the National Institute for Developmental Education on the campus of Appalachian State University, the Kellogg Institute provides an intensive 4-week summer residential learning experience during which participants design a practicum project to be carried out on their home campuses. Three hours of graduate credit are earned upon completion of the practicum project.

Grounded in theory and research, Kellogg Institute seminars are led by experts in fields such as Assessment and Placement, Designing Learning Environments, Academic Support Services, Technology in the Developmental Education Classroom, and Program Evaluation. Special Interest groups meet to discuss challenges and share solutions. Discussion of national policy issues related to developmental education is an important component of the Kellogg experience as well.

Kellogg alumni comprise a network of scholar-practitioners, empowered to advocate for best practices in developmental education and student success at their home institutions and beyond.

Participants in the Kellogg Institute design practicum projects to:

- Develop student assessment systems
- Design a program evaluation system
- Conduct program evaluation activities
- Use principles of instructional design and adult learning theory to inform teaching
- Improve student retention
- Promote students' academic and personal development

Who We Are: The National Center for Developmental Education (NCDE) provides instruction, training programs, research, and other services consistent with the purpose of developmental education and the missions of Appalachian State University and the Reich College of Education. These services are provided to a national audience of professionals dedicated to serving underprepared and disadvantaged college students. In addition to the graduate programs in developmental education and the Kellogg Institute, the NCDE also provides specialized workshops and training sessions on a contract or fee basis. The content of these sessions is designed according to the professional development needs of a particular audience.
